


Home Learning Year 3

Using inverse.

Have a go at these 6 addition and subtraction problems (using the column method). Once you've worked each one out, use the inverse calculation to check your answer.

e.g.
$$320 + 430 = 750$$

Roman Numerals
Learn the Roman Numerals from
1 to 12 (you will find these on
some clocks). Can you see some

Could you try to work out how
the numbers 13-20 are written?


